Exciting Times at Allisonville

This summer I was informed that Allisonville was selected to be the next school renovated. Crooked Creek and Spring Mill are also in the planning stages. The District selected the architects and we have had several meetings. The plan is to start renovating Allisonville next May. We are hoping to move Allisonville to the vacant John Strange building next summer and are awaiting final approval. John Strange will be moving into the new Clearwater Elementary building a mile from Allisonville, on 79th Street. Allisonville (our students and teachers) will be at John Strange for one year while they are renovating the Allisonville building.

Allisonville has a Design Team with 7 members. It consists of administrators, teachers, and other staff members. The architects presented 5 Options to the District Committee and it was narrowed to three when they presented to the Design Team. We have 3 scheduled meetings and hope to present to our staff on September 7th. The front area is a focus area as we continue to improve safety in our buildings. The cafeteria, gym, stage, bathrooms, special education rooms, World Language and small group areas all will be addressed. Every classroom will be touched.

This Friday, August 31st, is a Coffee with the Principal. I will be sharing additional information at that time. I will also have information about the process each month in the newsletter.

We have had a smooth start and have 5 new staff members. They are Seth Hoffman-Grade 4, Matthew Condon-Grade 3, Taylor Post- Grade 2, Elisa Knoll Music Teacher, and Taylor Scott-Grade 2 maternity leave for first semester. Our enrollment has increased to 725 students.

It is super cool to think in 2 years we will be back in a beautiful renovated school.

| Staff Spotlight: Elisa Knoll | Staff Spotlight continued |
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| Last spring, Elisa Knoll got the phone call from her sister she'd been waiting on for four years. Knoll's nieces and nephew attend Allisonville, and the family had often joked that if Mrs. Sukup retired, Knoll would come down from Chicago and become the school's music teacher. | "I'm excited to see where the kids are by the end of the year – how much they can grow and do. It's already started happening. Kids are coming in and asking if they can do certain songs. Are we doing the 'Up the Ladder' song? They're talking about it outside the music room. It's the most heart-warming thing." |
| "My sister called me and said, don't panic, but we've got to talk!" Mrs. Sukup had announced her retirement. It was go time. Knoll immediately reached out about the position. In addition to quickly sending a resume and cover letter, she provided a digital portfolio with video samples of what she'd been doing as a music teacher in Chicago. | I know what she means, because when I told my daughter Rosie that I was interviewing Miss Knoll on the phone, she made me promise to let her sing to her teacher when I was done. And when I opened the door and held the phone up, Rosie didn't miss a beat. |
| "This really was the absolute dream come true. It was a running joke in my family for 4 years. Then all the sudden it happened. I do not take that lightly. I'm in such an incredible school with incredible staff and parents. That's already been so apparent," Knoll said. | "Up the ladder! Down the ladder! One by one!" Earlier in our conversation, Knoll had told me she loves music because "it gives you a connection." As I stood listening to Miss Knoll laugh with delight at the unexpected solo, I had the privilege to see that connection firsthand. |
